**Section R1 (13 marks)**

Read the following passage and answer all the questions.

**Arrows Across America**

Walkers have discovered strange concrete markings on their travels across America and have been looking into an interesting piece of American history. The markings are actually giant arrows which measure up to 21 metres in length. Although they are found in apparently random places, these arrows were once markers for early airmail flights across the US. They formed the first land-based navigation system in the world.

The concrete arrows showed pilots which direction they needed to fly in to reach the next stop to deliver mail. Airmail in the US began in 1911, with the first official flight flying the length of California. After 1918, the US Postal Service began to use old war planes for mail delivery, the service expanded and flight routes got longer. Pilots needed help to guide them. This meant lighting huge bonfires to act as guideposts. Although this was impractical, it wasn't until 1924 that someone had the idea of giant arrows. By the end of the year, there were arrows across Wyoming and Ohio. By 1929, the arrows could direct flights all the way across America to the East Coast. They were placed across the country at 10-kilometre intervals, painted vivid yellow with a gas light on top so they could be seen in poor weather and at night.

The arrows were forgotten for a long time until walkers Brian and Charlotte Smith came across one in the countryside. They made a map of their discovery's location and sent an email to friends in American walking clubs from Oregon to North Carolina. The email said, 'In the deserts of Arizona, fortunate walkers have encountered something puzzling: a gigantic concrete arrow, twenty one metres in length. Help us find more!'

The couple set up a website, *Arrows Across America*, as a gallery so anyone can post their pictures of the arrows. Brian and Charlotte have taken photos of 40 themselves but on the website there are now shots of all 102 located arrows, 16 of those in Nevada. However, there are dozens more to be discovered, possibly hundreds. Unfortunately, some are badly damaged and many have been destroyed completely. However, the search is on.

A. The annual surfing dog competition has taken place in San Diego on the West Coast of America. Thousands of people gathered at the beach to watch the pets ride the waves. These talented dogs are judged on their ability to stay on the board, ride the wave and just have fun. Money raised from the event goes to a local animal centre which is home to many of the dogs taking part.

B. A Chinese man has captured rare video footage of a giant panda in the wild. The panda was caught in bushes so the man and his friends helped to free it. Zoologists say that China has more than 1,590 giant pandas in the wild but seeing one is unusual. Wylie and his father were fossil hunting near a shopping centre in Texas when they found the bones of a *Nodosaur* - a pony-sized dinosaur. They discovered the remains last September, but it's taken over seven months to get permission to dig them up. This was frustrating, especially for Wylie, who was keen to see his fossil in his local museum.

E. Australia's Great Barrier Reef is home to a huge variety of underwater plants and animals. UN experts were today considering whether to add the area to the World Heritage danger list, a list of places at risk of being destroyed. They decided *not* to put the reef on the list, for now, but did say more must be done to protect it. The Australian Government must produce an action plan to be implemented as soon as possible.
